



NACDS Foundation Community Pharmacy Faculty Award 2009 Award Recipients

The NACDS Foundation recognizes the important role community pharmacy faculty play in preparing students for careers as leaders in community pharmacy, as well as advancing the practice of community pharmacy.

With Wyeth's support, the NACDS Foundation established an award to recognize a pharmacy school full time or shared faculty member who has made significant contributions to the practice of community pharmacy through innovations in patient care. These contributions may be in the form of sustained exemplary service to help advance community pharmacy, a single outstanding achievement, or a combination of accomplishments that have advanced community pharmacy practice, and ultimately, patient care. In addition, faculty members are assessed on their preparation of future community pharmacy leaders. The winners of this year's faculty award are:

First-place Award: Jean-Venable "Kelly" R. Goode, RPh, Virginia Commonwealth University School of Pharmacy

Dr. Goode received a \$5,000 stipend payable to Virginia Commonwealth University School of Pharmacy for a project in Dr. Goode's area of community pharmacy practice. Dr. Goode also attended the 2009 Pharmacy & Technology Conference where she was publicly recognized.

Jean Venable "Kelly" R. Goode is currently Professor, Department of Pharmacy at the Virginia Commonwealth University School of Pharmacy. She also serves as the Director of the Community Pharmacy Practice Program and the Community Pharmacy Practice Residency Program. Dr. Goode has served as a clinical faculty member and led the development of innovative pharmacy services with Ukrop's Pharmacies since 1996. She has directly contributed to the advancement of community pharmacy through the establishment of patient care services in this supermarket chain pharmacy environment. Dr. Goode's leadership in practice-based research, medication therapy management, and pharmacy-based immunization delivery has been significant in advancing the role of the pharmacist in community practice to the national level. In her role as the Director of VCU's Community Pharmacy Residency Program she oversees the entire Community Pharmacy Residency Program. VCU's program has become one of the largest and most well respected accredited community pharmacy residency programs in the United States. Dr. Goode's accomplishments recognize her reputation as an exemplary role model, teacher, practitioner, and champion of patient care.

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First Runner-up: Stefanie P. Ferreri, PharmD, CDE, FAPhA, University of North Carolina Eshelman School of Pharmacy

Dr. Ferreri received her BS in pharmacy from the University of Connecticut and her PharmD from Campbell University. She completed a general practice residency at the University of Connecticut Health Care Center and her community pharmacy residency with Ward Drug in Nashville, North Carolina. Dr. Ferreri joined the University of North Carolina (UNC) faculty in 2001 and became the director of the Community Pharmacy Residency Program in 2005. As a practitioner, Dr. Ferreri was instrumental in instituting innovative patient care services that have become the earmarks of the Kerr Drug Health Care Centers, many of which were the first to produce a revenue stream for non-distributive services. Dr. Ferreri is the face of UNC's community pharmacy initiatives. She leads the Community Pharmacy Advisory Committee and instituted one of UNC's most popular electives where students, in collaboration with a community pharmacist, must prepare and present a business plan for a contemporary pharmacy service. Dr. Ferreri has grown the Residency program she directs and has been the principle mentor for 25 residents in 8 years. She mentors her residents and has been successful in developing strong patient care practitioners for the future of the pharmacy profession.

Second Runner-up: Kimberly Crosby, PharmD, BCPS, GCP, The University of Oklahoma College of Pharmacy

Dr. Crosby worked as a pharmacy manager for May's Drug Stores (now a division of USA Drug) in Tulsa Oklahoma after receiving her BS in Pharmacy in 1999. She decided to go back to school for her Doctor of Pharmacy degree and after graduation; Dr. Crosby accepted a pharmacy practice residency position with Saint Francis Health System in Tulsa. Her interest in the community pharmacy practice setting drove her to accept a position as the Director of Clinical Pharmacy Services with May's Drug Stores, where she worked to develop a variety of clinical services offered to the pharmacy customers in the stores. Dr. Crosby successfully pursued a co-funded faculty position with May's Drug Stores and the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center College of Pharmacy in 2002, where she was able to diversify her accomplishments in pharmacy both inside the classroom as well as outside. After initially signing on with May's Drug Stores, then accepting a dually-funded faculty position, May's Drug Stores merged with USA Drug, a company now approximately 150 stores strong. Dr. Crosby has published research in the area of community-based diabetes management program among HMO enrollees. She is responsible for the Community Pharmacy Residency Program at Oklahoma College of Pharmacy. She spends much of her time mentoring and training students, residents, and pharmacists. She is a leader and mentor to all those she comes in contact with.
